PURE HOCKEY MOST VALUABLE PLAYER

TPS HOCKEY PLAYER OF THE YEAR

This honor is awarded by the head coaches to a player from those nominated for consideration. The player receiving this recognition has demonstrated superior play and leadership for her team. TPS Hockey is the presenting sponsor. BC forward Kelli Stack took the league by storm in 2006-2007 as one of six freshman players for the Eagles. It marked the first time in league history that the same player earned both Player and Rookie of the Year honors in the same season. Stack posted 54 points overall (17g, 37a) in 36 games, while registering 34 points (13g, 21a) in 21 league contests, both totals mark league bests last season. Her 1.50 points per game ranked ninth among Division I players. Past Winners include Sadie Wright-Ward- UNH (05-06), Steph Jones- UNH and Karen Thatcher (04-05), Carolyn Gordon- UNH and Chanda Gunn- NU (03-04) and Jen Huggon- UNH (02-03).

ITECH ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

This award is also voted by the head coaches and is given to the first-year player who has shown skill, ability and leadership beyond that expected of a player in her rookie year. ITECH is the presenting sponsor.

Stack was the first Eagle in school history named Rookie of the Year. She was a First-Team All-Star and was named Hockey East Player of the Month in January. Stack had 19 points (7g, 12a) and a +10 plus/minus rating in nine games, leading the Eagles to a 7-1-1 record in the month. Stack's 34 points in league games was the third best total in the five-year history of the conference.

Past Winners include Sam Faber- UNH (05-06), Jaclyn Hawkins- UConn (04-05), Sonny Watrous- PC (03-04) and Lindsay Hansen- UNH (02-03).

CCM COACH OF THE YEAR

Sponsored by CCM, this award goes to the head coach who is considered to have demonstrated the highest number of significant accomplishments over the course of the season as voted by the conference's head coaches.

Mutch, a first time winner of the award, led the Eagles to a 24-10-2 overall mark and the program's first trip to the Frozen Four in his fourth season in Chestnut Hill. He also helped the team to a second place finish in the league standings with a 15-6-0 record in Hockey East play and they earned a trip to the Hockey East playoffs for the fourth straight season. BC schedule was highlighted by a 3-2 overtime win against Dartmouth in the NCAA quarterfinal round on March 10 to earn a trip to Lake Placid.

HOCKEY EAST ALL-STARS BATTLE OLYMPIANS, DEC. 11, 2005



The Hockey East All-Stars played to win in Dec. '05

Exhibition games typically don't spark the kind of excitement that was generated on Dec. 11, 2005 at UNH's Whittemore Center, when an inspired group of Hockey East All-Stars gave the USA Olympic team all it could handle in an epic mid-season match.

The All-Stars jumped out to a surprising 2-0 first-period lead thanks to goals by Boston University's Cara Hendry and Maine defenseman Kelly Law. But the National Team came storming back with two goals in the first 2:07 of the second period and it was a dogfight the rest of the way. Team USA got the bulk of the shots-on-goal, and finally grabbed the lead midway through the third when former Harvard star Angela Ruggiero got the first of two quick goals leading the team to a 5-2 victory. UConn goalie Kaitlyn Shain was impressive against the high-powered Olympians, stopping 41 shots. Former Northeastern All-American Chanda Gunn was in net for Team USA, and finished with 10 saves.

"This Hockey East Team is probably the college team that extended us the most," said Team USA coach Ben Smith, acknowledging the spirited play of the All-Stars.

UConn's Heather Linstad, the senior member of women's Hockey East coaching fraternity with 211 career victories, served as head coach of the All-Star squad. Meanwhile, the 2006 U.S. National Team was loaded with America's best at every position, including Gunn and former UNH sniper Tricia Dunn. Dunn won the gold medal as a member of Team USA at the 1998 Olympics and was also on the silver-winning squad in 2002.

Plans are underway for WHEA to host another All-Star game vs. 2010 Team USA in the fall of 2009.
